Before seven o'clock one Saturday morning, a large crowd had already gathered at the stadium. David sat at the starting line, his gloved hands gripping his wheelchair. With his heart thumping, the boy wondered if he would be able to complete the race. His classmates were all there to support him. From afar, he could see them holding up big banners which screamed: WE ARE WITH YOU! ALL THE WAY, DAVID! 5 Heartened, he smiled and waved back. He was not going to let them down.

Born with a severe condition that left him paralysed from the waist down, many doctors doubted he would live more than a few days. However, he defied all odds and spent the first six years of his life without a wheelchair and medical care in an orphanage. "If I want to be what other children aspire to be, I have to get there myself," David recalled. At six, he was adopted and following that, many things happened. Thanks to his adoptive parents, he underwent several surgeries to improve his condition. As a result, he was able to attend school and even took up sports to help strengthen his bones and muscles. Then, he fell in love with wheelchair racing. Unfortunately, he did not have a lot of coordination or strength but he had a will to keep going. Once, without warning, his condition took a turn for the worse and it almost derailed his pursuit of his **passion**.

One day, David's teachers encouraged him to compete alongside his non-wheelchair schoolmates. Unsure and yet grateful for the opportunity, he thought he should give it a shot. By the time the race was about to begin, the sun had risen. David 20 was glad that he was well prepared. Adjusting the cap on his head and his gloves, David was all ready to **protect** himself from the heat and the vigorous strokes to his wheelchair. Some of his fingers had pieces of plasters to protect the blisters which had developed during his rigorous training. David's eyes followed the starter who was waving a red flag. As soon as the gun was fired, David was off. The entire stadium 25 erupted into thunderous cheers.

David pushed forward with all his might, his hands gripping the wheels the whole time for the long-distance race. His wheelchair rolled steadily out of the stadium, passing the shophouses. David fell behind despite doing everything he could to keep up with the other competitors. With each passing hour, David was breathing harder. Every single stroke made his arms and shoulders ache badly. Still, he focussed fiercely.

Overhead, the sun continued to blaze in the cloudless sky. David was exhausted and parched. His head felt as if it were on fire as the sun continued to burn through his cap. **That** was depleting his energy. He was beginning to feel weak and weary. As he pushed on, the heated metal of his wheels burned into his hands. Nonetheless, he never thought of stopping. He leaned on one thing that he could control – his attitude. The fireball was his foe, like all the **obstacles** that stood in his way – his pain, his disability and his fears of failure. But he was determined to overcome every single one of them.

"Go, David, go!" the crowd chanted again. David propelled forward. He felt as if he were flying at an unstoppable velocity. The sunshine-yellow tape was looming nearer and nearer. Then, he was zipping past the ribbon. The entire stadium electrified with victorious screams.
