



<u>History</u>

FoodShare is a non-profit organisation that feeds the needy through its food distribution programme. It was established in February 2010 after Anthony and Ida Bandara read a report in The Citizen Times about bakeries discarding their unsold bread. Roused to action, they then decided to channel surplus food from bakeries to those in need.

FoodShare started with 130 volunteers in 2010. At the end of 2021, our volunteers had multiplied to over 12,000, and together we reached 50,300 beneficiaries across Singapore.

Here's what our Bread Runner of 10 years, Martin Goh, has to say:



Every Sunday evening, my family and I go on our Bread Run route, where we collect unsold bread and buns at Jia Yi Bakery and deliver them to St. Luke's ElderCare Centre. We also help out at Narayana Social Service on a monthly basis as a family, where we pack food rations together for distribution to the needy.

Perhaps that's why your daughters have this ingrained desire to give. They always have a huge smile on their faces on your Bread Runs!

Yes, they are happy to go on the routes! FoodShare's concept of saving unsold bread that is in perfectly good condition and giving it out to those who need it makes a lot of sense to us.

My elder daughter organises community service activities like food packing and distribution with her own friends as well. She would also save up the money she earned from her own entrepreneurial efforts and buy food for the needy.

One fine day, I could not take it any longer and decided to probe her about this.

"Well, orange works fine for autumn. It's a classic colour for all seasons," Aunt Jo 35 replied nonchalantly, her blank expression showing no hint of what I suspected.


